Kiwanis Manor needs your help

After serving East Troy for over 30 years, the Kiwanis Manor is looking for the community's help to financially keep it afloat.

The Manor is now experiencing a cash crisis, which is best demonstrated by the fact they have outstanding accounts payable that are at least \$400,000 greater than their outstanding accounts receivable, according to a press release. Their vendors have been patient, but as their bills remain unpaid for 90-120 days past the due date they are becoming very impatient, according to Manor officials. Several have threatened various types of legal action if funds are not forthcoming very soon, and a judgment in court against the Manor is expected in the next

The history

In the mid 1970s Merrill Pinch inspired others to give birth to the Manor. Their vision was for East Troy to have a facil-

ity where elderly individuals could live in Troy residents had to leave the community comfort, close to their families, friends, churches, businesses and doctors that they had learned to rely on for years, according to a press release. At the time there was a nursing home in Whitewater, Burlington, Elkhorn and many in the Milwaukee area. East

for skilled care, and that struck these men as being wrong. A quarter million dollars was subsequently raised in 1974 and 1975.

Camp Invention coming to East Troy

Children will have the opportunity to design miniature amusement park rides, create safe vehicles, and brainstorm on Planet ZAK when the Camp Invention program arrives at East Troy Community Schools for the first time ever this summer. Open to children entering first through sixth grades, the program is scheduled for July 21 through July 25 at Prairie View Elementary School.

The camp Invention program fosters creativity, teamwork, inventive-thinking skills and science literacy. The program was created in 1990 by the National Inventors Hall of Fame Foundation, and receives support from the United States Patent and Trademark Office.

Throughout each day, children will

participate in hands-on, interactive activities that encourage creativity and inventive solutions. Eileen Schieble, the East Troy K-12 Gifted Program Coordinator, will direct a staff of local instructors and counselors. The program features a low staff-child ratio, with one staff member for every eight children.

"Camp Invention's creators surprise and delight us with their innovative approach to education," Schieble said. Children who attend Camp Invention learn skills that enhance their abilities to brainstorm, solve problems and work as a team. As educators and parents, we know that children of all ages should continue sharpening these skills as we enter an era in which critical thinking will be extremely important to their future.

More than 60,000 children in 48 states across the country attended the Camp Invention program in 2007. "Camp Invention is the perfect program for local communities," explains Schieble. "The curricula we offer each summer provides a fun and creative educational experience in the community where a child lives. Local educators put their own spin on the program so that each of our sites is slightly different. We value the fact that we can offer that kind of flexibility.

The camp Invention program gets accolades from around the country. The president of the American Chemical Society, Catherine T. Hunt, spoke on National Public Radio's Science Friday last August regarding Camp Invention as "bringing forward the next generation of inventors." members was Bill Pulliam, who articulated the three, coequal, primary goals of the Manor while he served on the Board of Di-

Manor officials say if a bed is available and you need it, you can have it. They are the only known facility in Walworth County that does not require a net worth statement or statement of financial resources prior to admittance, according to the release

There are trade-offs with that policy, however. Residents that have no assets, either because they never had any or they have given them away, may qualify for Title XIX benefits, or Medicaid and welfare payments. In 2006, the combination of state and federal payments for the care of these residents was approximately \$25 per day less than the actual cost of providing the services. In 2007, funding was cut by \$3 per day per resident backdated to October. Reimbursement is now at least \$30 per day less than the cost of care.

Many factors contributed to the Manor's current situation. In 2006, their state survey was extremely disappointing. The Manor was cited for numerous violations as a result of what they called outdated policies and procedures, and the declining physical condition of the building. The net cost of correcting the operational problems was about

The Manor had seen the Kiwanis Colonial as its light at the end of the tunnel for four years, though they are now are reluctant to bring its plans to fruition. The assisted living facility is intended to be built immediately adjacent to the Manor and include a therapy and rehabilitation center to attract more short-term residents that are paid for with Medicare benefits. This federal program reimburses them at a rate that does cover all of the expenses for care.

Given the current financial situation at the Manor, especially the cash crises, moving forward with the borrowing of funds to build the Colonial appears irresponsible, the release said. The Colonial cannot fully meet its goals without the Manor by its side, and the Manor may not be able to continue to exist without the Colonial by its side, officials said.

Administrator Dawn Willert stresses that they will continue to have the highest quality of care for residents, despite the crisis.

The Manor needs about \$400,000 worth of cash contributions, or pledges of a contribution, within the next 30 days. That number is significantly less than the support that the community provided prior to the building of the Manor in the mid 1970s, when adjusted for inflation, the release said.

Every donation, whether very large or

modest, will be greatly appreciated.

New business hopes to heal East Troy

East Troy Acupuncture, 3066 W. Main St. Suite 104, is looking to help the East Troy community using Chinese healing methods.

Chinese healing methods.

Brandon LaGreca, a licensed acupuncturist, received a Bachelor of Science degree in biology and said he started on the pre-med route. Then he decided to go a different route.

LaGreca said he had three or four schools he was looking into. Since he could not decide which one to attend, he said he decided to wait a week and see if he'd receive any sign to help make his decision.

LaGreca said during that week he saw several signs for Oregon (where one of the schools was located), including a magazine article and license plate, so his choice was clear. His mother's cousin also lived in a suburb of Portland, so he stayed with her once he was there. LaGreca then took a three-year Chinese medicine program and worked in a clinic. He also met his fiancé, who is a student of organic farming at the Michaels Fields Agricultural Institute in East Troy.

LaGreca also studied in China for five weeks and worked in hospitals. He said the Chinese have the opposite approach to America, as acupuncture has been practiced for thousands of years and western medicine has been integrated into it.

LaGreca said the business has had a good response so far. He gave a lecture March 2, and said people have been asking questions. He urges people to call to ask if something can be treated by Chinese medicine, and said he can refer them otherwise.

East Troy Acupuncture has a room

where LaGreca can talk with patients in private, and a group treatment room with chairs where up to three patients can be treated. He works at removing blockages, and letting the body do the rest. He said that is why Chinese medicine can treat anyone — it treats the person instead of the disease.

He also uses herbs to help with different things when patients come in, and sells medicinal teas. LaGreca is considering eventually bringing in a massage therapist.


LaGreca hopes that with treatment, people eventually will not need him. "My ultimate goal is to put myself out of business," LaGreca said.

LaGreca can treat a few patients at once in a community clinic, and offers a sliding scale of \$15-35 a treatment. Patients can come in more often that way and it is more affordable.

LaGreca said it is a way to help the working class and one solution to the national health care crisis. The traditional treatment is \$65 per session.

A reading corner is also offered, and patients can use that without

appointments.

Boyes brings experience to chief position

The Village of East Troy's new Chief of Police brings with him several years of experience, and a familiarity with Wisconsin

Alan Boyes said the position was posted on the Wisconsin Lawn Enforcement Web site, so he applied from there. The recruitment process was nationally-advertised, according to a press release from the village.

The East Troy Village Board approved of Boyes taking the position Oct. 22. He began the job Dec. 17, replacing Interim Police Chief Robert W. Roberts. David Fox retired last summer after 38 years on the force.

Boyes said he used to live in Eau Claire. He now lives in Lindenhurst, which is near the Wisconsin border.

Boyes has over 20 years of law enforcement experience, a Bachelor's Degree in criminal justice from Columbia College and a Master's Degree in business and organizational management from Webster University. He also spent eight years in the military, also doing law enforcement.

Boyes said he brings several years of experience to the position. He has tactical team experience, has done field training and covert operations

and covert operations.

He was a field training officer until becoming sergeant, and then managed the program. When officers come out of the academy (which is 480 hours in Illinois, he said), officers have a 12-week on-the-job training program.

Prior to starting in East Troy, Boyes said he was excited to begin the job, and praised the Village Board's commitment to progressive police standards.

"Alan is an excellent choice for this position and will bring new perspectives to the department," Roberts said. "The village conducted a thorough study and needs assessment before making the hiring decision, which shows their interest in keeping the village safe."

In June the Village Board contracted

In June the Village Board contracted with Criminal Justice Associates to evaluate the police department's operation. The report detailed operational improvement needs that are customary for a small police agency, according to a press release





Manor has experienced operating deficits for at least the last 10 years, not unlike the majority of skilled nursing facilities in

The long-term solution will be a combination of ending reliance on agency labor, improving the resident mix to incorporate more Medicare and private pay residents to offset the losses incurred by having Medicaid (Title XIX) residents, and the ancillary revenue that will come from the addition of the Colonial assisted living facility and the new therapy center. Fundraising has been and will continue to be important in keeping the Manor going, but the annual needs are expected to be minimal compared to the current crisis.

Why should I donate now if the Save the Manor fundraising might not be successful

enough to actually save the Manor? The Manor Board of Directors needs to be able to gauge the community's commitment to the Manor. A pledge to make a donation when the total of donations and pledges reaches a certain level (say \$200,000) is a solution to this very good question. If everyone waits to see if the fund drive will

be successful it will surely fail.

Why were we not aware of the Manor's financial troubles? As mentioned above deficits are nothing new to the Manor. The Board has been reluctant to 'go public' with the extent of the Manor's financial difficulties for fear that the news might negatively impact perceptions of the Manor by current and potential residents and the public. The magnitude of the situation has made sharing this unavoidable.


