
of Sue and Gary Budzien. Pease sought to honor and preserve the memory of those who inspired her by naming an honoree for each nonprofit she supported.

At the University of Wisconsin– Whitewater, she established two scholarships: one in memory of her late husband and UW-Whitewater professor, Joseph J. Pease, and another for juniors and seniors in the College of Arts and Communication.

Pease has donated tens of thousands of dollars in scholarships to students with financial need, saying she takes joy in helping them achieve their dreams.
